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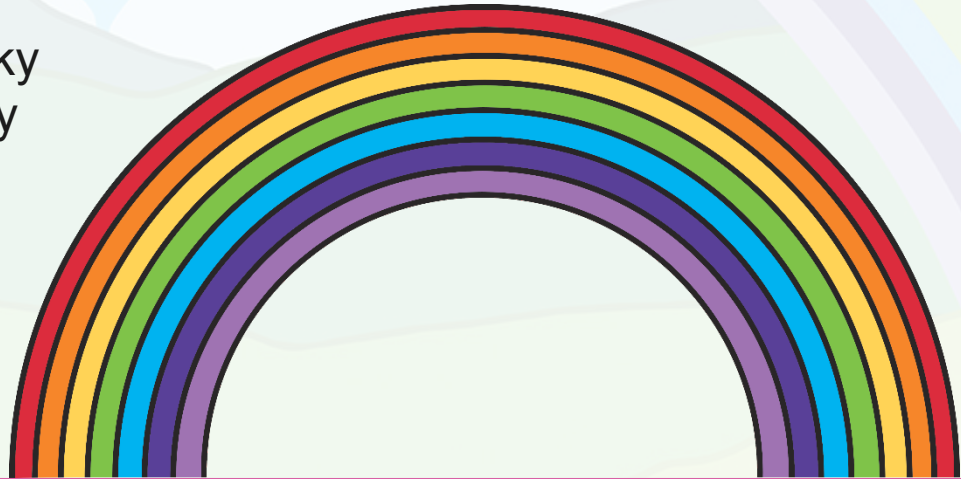
What Is a Rainbow?

Rainbows are lovely to look at.

A rainbow is an arc made up of seven colours.

A rainbow appears in the sky when it is raining and sunny at the same time.

A rainbow will appear opposite the sun.

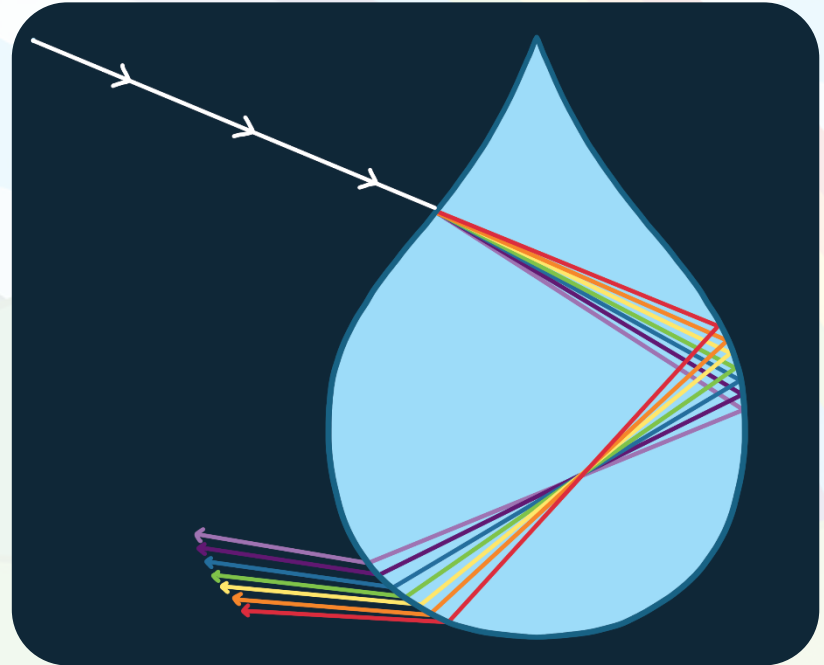


Have you ever seen a rainbow?

How Does a Rainbow Happen?

When it is raining, light passes through the raindrops.

The white light all around us is made up of different colours, all blended together.



When the white light passes through the raindrops, it splits up into separate colours. That's what we see when a rainbow forms!

Why Is a Rainbow Arc-Shaped?

The light makes an arc shape because the separate colours have different wavelengths.

This means that some are short and some are longer.

When the colours are seen together, they form an arc shape.

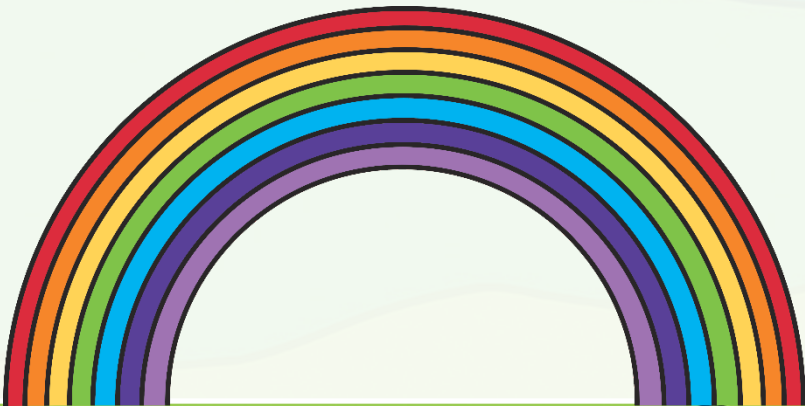
The Colours of the Rainbow
